I. 2nd Reading of Property Tax Levy Ordinance Description:

In your packet is a copy of the annual ordinance to set the property tax rates for the City of Marion. Pursuant to Councilmen Arflack's amendment at the 1st reading, this ordinance would set the personal property tax rate at the compensating rate of 0.222. This rate would result in the City collecting roughly \$400 less in revenues. The real property tax rate would be adjusted to reflect a 4% increase. This means the rate would go from .224 to .230 which will result in a \$7,376 increase in revenues. As was previously discussed, this would average about a \$5 annual increase per property. Total property tax collection would result in roughly a \$7,000 increase in revenue.

II. 2nd Reading of Employee Handbook Ordinance Description:

In your council meeting's packet, you will receive a copy of the ordinance which would replace Chapter 35 of the City Code with an updated personnel policy designed by the Kentucky League of Cities. A copy of that handbook was included in your packet last meeting (if you would like another copy please email me and I will send you a new copy). Minor grammatical errors have been corrected since the last meeting. If this handbook is approved copies will be distributed to all staff and a meeting will be schedule to present the details to them.

III. Confirmation of Mayor Appointment to the Ethics Board <u>Description:</u>

The Mayor has proposed appointing Linda Schumann to fill a vacant seat on the ethics board. The Council may take action to confirm this appointment prior to making the selection final. Last meeting Linda was proposed to fill a vacant seat on the revolving loan fund board, but we have since discovered that the appointment was improper as the previous Mayor appointed Jerry Collins and Jim Johnson at the February 20th council meeting prior to resigning. After consulting with the city attorney, it was determined that since the opening did not exist the appointments of Linda and Wade were invalid. Linda has offered to instead fill the open vacancy on the ethics board. This exercise is a good reason to maintain a committee appointment list with expiration dates. The list I have created has been corrected.

IV. 2nd Reading of Marion Ordinance Code Update Description:

Once a year, the Council is provided an updated code supplement from American Legal Publishing Corp. This supplement assures that city code is consistent with changes in Federal and State law. A copy of the ordinance is in your packet. If you wish to review a copy of the supplement packet you are welcome to see the City office were a copy is available for you.

V. 2nd Reading of 2017-18 Budget Amendment Ordinance Description:

Pursuant to the previously approved emergency ordinance, it is necessary to amend the annual budget to reflect a change in spending for the Municipal Aid Fund. Included in your packet is a copy of the ordinance which indicates an increase in expenditures for that fund sufficient to cover the \$85,500 project.

ORDINANCE NO. 17-09

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE TAX LEVY FOR THE YEAR OF 2017 CITY OF MARION, KENTUCKY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MARION, KENTUCKY AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That an ad valorem tax of \$.230 be and is hereby levied on each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) of fair cash value of all real property in the City of Marion, Kentucky.

SECTION 2: That an ad valorem tax of \$.222 be and is hereby levied on each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) of fair cash value of all personal property in the City of Marion, Kentucky.

SECTION 3: That an ad valorem tax of \$.230 be and is hereby levied on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of fair cash value of all Public Utilities.

SECTION 4: That in accordance with KRS 132.487 (2) and ad valorem tax of \$.229 be and is hereby levied on each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) of fair cash value of all motor vehicles in the City of Marion, Kentucky; and this accordance with KRS 132.488, and as valorem tax of \$.229 be and is hereby levied on each One Hundred Dollar (\$100.00) of fair cash value of all motorboats in the City of Marion, Kentucky.

SECTION 5: That the tax under Sections 1,2,3, and 4 shall be levied for the purpose of providing public services such as fire protection, police protection, maintenance, repair and improvement of street and parks and for taking care of the general miscellaneous expenses of the City of Marion, Kentucky. All taxes listed, supra, shall be paid into the General Fund of the City.

SECTION 6: That this tax levy ordinance DOES NOT pertain or relate to the franchise tax on all deposits, as defined in KRS Chapter 136, maintained by such financial institutions in the City of Marion, Kentucky in that the Bank Franchise and Local Deposits Tax was set by Ordinance Number 96-13 passed on August 19,1996 and published in the Crittenden Press on August 22, 1996.

SECTION 7: That all taxes levied hereby shall become due and payable on the first day of July, 2017. The City of Marion, Kentucky shall have a lien for taxes upon any and all property subject to taxation, which lien shall be superior to all encumbrances prior or subsequent; and all taxes which are not paid on or before the first day of November, 2017 shall be deemed delinquent and shall be subjected to a penalty of twenty-five per cent (25%) and shall bear interest at the rate of ten per cent (10%) per annum. Furthermore any individual, firm or corporation failing to pay such taxes herein levied by this ordinance on or before the first day of November, 2017 shall pay said twenty-five (25%) penalty and interest at the rate of ten per cent (10%) per annum in addition to the amount of such tax then due and unpaid.

SECTION 8: All ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.

Section One: Chapter 35: PERSONNEL POLICIES of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Marion, Kentucky, is repealed and the revised Employee Handbook, which is attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as if stated in full, is hereby adopted as the Employee Handbook which will govern the policies and procedures concerning Employees of the City of Marion, Kentucky, henceforth.

Section Three: All ordinances and parts thereof in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of the conflict.

Section Four: That this ordinance shall be effective upon its second reading and publication in the City's legal organ.

This Order shall be in full force and effect upon its passage by law pursuant to Kentucky Revised Statutes.
